What is a resumé? It generally seeks to describe us so that an interested party can determine whether there's a match. It's a kind of love letter. It says, I'm beautiful. It says, I'm what I am, warts and all. It says, scars make the body more beautiful. It says, I know things. I know how to do things, more than one thing.

The resumé groups attributes, chronologically, categorically. It tends to take the form of a list, or lists, often with multiple columns.

Because most of us are not wretchedly aged, we will probably not have a lot of conventional professional and other achievements to cite. For this reason, we'll need to find other things — attributes, qualities, objects (that you collect), memories, things we've lost or found, inventories (of clothing, games, books), etc., etc., — that help describe us.

And so, start with a list. As you compile this list, and then review it, you will see that entries group themselves, suggest yet other like entries.

This will form you substance of your cv.

Groups of entries will have headings (either conceptual, e.g., "education" or "body scars", or chronological, e.g., childhood, first Grade, 10th Grade, etc). Your design and use of grid might allow you to present these headings above those entries, or perhaps aligned to their left.

How will you use your grid, tabs, even a table, to arrange this material?
